Message from the National Director

As National Director of Habitat for Humanity Ethiopia I would like to extend my deepest appreciation and gratitude to all Habitat for Humanity families and supporters who made the year 2019/2020 to be a year full of achievement amidst the tough times as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic which affected the whole world, including Ethiopia.

By joining Habitat Ethiopia I am privileged to work for the vulnerable in guaranteeing the basic human right of a decent place to live and access to water, basic hygiene and sanitation services. In the year we completed, Habitat Ethiopia's work expanded both geographically and in the amount of funds invested from various sources. Nonetheless, the year has been challenging with the COVID-19 pandemic that significantly affected raising funds for shelter construction. In addition, the social distancing has restricted our movement which affected the ongoing construction and new projects.

Despite these challenges, the office has strategically reached several donors to raise funds for the COVID-19 response, and other projects. We have started developing DR3 strategy and Theory of Changes for programs to further strengthen our program interventions. Habitat Ethiopia's staff has grown in number and technical skills, currently the organization has more than 32 people staff. Our office in Shashemene has a full team working on KOICA and German donors funded projects with a focus on WASH.

Habitat for Humanity Ethiopia focuses on improving living conditions of the needy and vulnerable families who live in poverty and are affected by health issues. We are giving due attention to elders, disabled, and female headed households to include in the decent housing and WASH programs. Currently we are implementing housing and WASH projects in 18 towns across the country in three regional states including Addis Ababa, Ethiopia's capital.

Urban slum issues will remain critical as we proceed into the new year, especially in Addis Ababa due to the highly congested, poorly serviced, and overpopulated areas with limited services for hygiene, sanitation, water, and dilapidated shelter. Shelter and WASH have a critical role in the current pandemic environment when people need to stay at home and control the spread of the virus. Habitat Ethiopia will continue to support people residing in slum areas to prevent the transmission of the disease. Donor funded project implementation will continue while focusing on finalizing our DR3 strategy, Theory of Change and National Office strategy development. There will be plans to build a stronger team including a cohesive senior management team and engaged staff.

The country's continuous instability due to various political, economic and social factors will be posing significant challenges in the year ahead. The COVID-19 pandemic will have impact on the amount of funds that we can generate for house construction and the ease of movement in implementing projects.

We will continue strengthening our strategic partnership with communities we are working and government in the target areas through the projects we are implementing. We will strengthen and develop strategic partnership with local donor missions, peer organizations and public private partners. The report will provide you an in-depth look of our journey in 2019/2020 with a good picture of our achievements, challenges, and plans. Once again, I would like to thank all our supporters, partners, communities and Habitat for Humanity Ethiopia staff who contributed for these achievements.

I am looking forward to 2020/2021 and hope it will be another fruitful year where we will be achieving more result and support the vulnerable.

Habitat for Humanity Ethiopia

Habitat for Humanity Ethiopia started work in 1993 focusing on mortgage housing as main intervention area. Habitat Ethiopia later diversified its work to integrate vulnerable group housing, and Water Sanitation Hygiene(WASH). Recently, Disaster Risk Reduction Response (DR3) and Resilience Building is included in the program to help families who suffer from severe shortage of water in some rural areas.

Habitat Ethiopia has been operating in 18 communities with the aim of assisting families to move to decent housing, have access to safe water, improve hygiene and sanitation knowledge and practice. We also work to enhance the capacity of families and communities for water scheme governance and sustainable use.

Over the last 27 years, Habitat Ethiopia has helped more than 120,000 families (608,000 individuals) through housing, urban water, sanitation and DR3-WASH Resilience Building. Currently, Habitat Ethiopia is looking for new opportunities to expand its work and implement more impactful projects. A strategic approach to this initiative includes establishing long-term partnership with international and local organizations to mobilize resources in a sustainable way.

Our work in Fiscal Year 2020

Integrated Urban Slum Upgrading (USU) Project

The 3-year project aims at providing basic urban services and infrastructure to the communities living in slum areas of Addis Ababa. More than 1,650 families have been served through our USU project with components completed since July 2019. Families and individuals moved out of substandard houses and get access to improved kitchens and sanitations facilities. In addition to providing housing units and sanitation facilities, Habitat Ethiopia constructed ditches and walkways and help families live in healthy environment.

For sustainable use of the infrastructure, Habitat Ethiopia also takes hygiene and sanitation awareness creation training as another essential component of the USU project. Considering the huge need, Habitat Ethiopia will continue the USU project and more resources are needed to transform the lives of thousands of families who live in poverty housing. We work with families and local administration to construct more houses, communal kitchens, communal toilets, ditches, and walkways. Currently, project activities are going on with limited capacity due to impact of COVID-19 pandemic. To continue the USU project and reach more families, we would like our partners to continue their support.













Meet Habitat families assisted through USU Project

Biritu Gelaye lives with 5 family members in Addis Ababa, Lideta Sub City. Her daughter, Selamawit Guta works in government office as a cleaner to assist the family. The family lives on low income. Habitat Ethiopia demolished the old house and reconstructed as new one. Biritu explained the changes they see in the new home:

"There is a big difference; the old house was broken in all its parts. There was no enough space for the family and some of us stay outside during the day. Thanks to Habitat and the guests (Twin Cities HFH team) who constructed the house; we now have safe and clean house which we can inherit to our children. The new house has space for my children.

«I cannot tell you how my children are happy. Now, our problem is the disease(COVID-19). We can't go out to get what we want. We don't have enough soap and sanitizers. We pray to God.»

Now we focus on how to get income!

Ashenefech Deyaso lives with 3 individuals. She used to live with family members in old house with poor structures. Habitat for Humanity Ethiopia constructed a new house for the family and the family transferred their home in February 2020. Ashenefech spoke about the new home:

"Thanks to Habitat and all who supported us to move out of difficult life. I feel happy and dignified because we have something to call our home. The new house has clean room and additional space at the top which is much better than the previous one.

Now, we want to focus on how to get income. But Corona makes our life very difficult. There is a challenge to get food and items to protect ourselves form the disease.

We need more support from our partners to help families build strength, stability, and independence!

We all grow when we assist each other!

Aberash Ararsa lives in Gullelle Sub City, Woreda(District 01) with her two married sons and seven grandchildren, as extended family. They all live under Aberash'e main family. One of her grandson, Kifle Yohannes Yitbarek has disability on his left foot. Since childhood, he depends on his grand-mother for livelihood as his mother left him. Aberash's income is very low; people in the neighborhood assist her in some cases. Aberash faces challenges to raise her grandson with low income as he always needs care from her. Kifle Yohannes recently graduated from local college and hired in metal workshop.

Before moving to new house constructed by Habitat Ethiopia in August 2019, Aberash's family used to live in old and dilapidated house. The house was with dirt floor, broken walls and leaking roof. It was crowded and family's health and safety was at risk. During rainy season they were troubled with water pouring from the roof and flooding from the door side.

"There is a big difference. I can't compare with the previous one. The new house is clean and comfortable," Aberash said. The house has three separate rooms for Aberash, gran son, the two sons and their children. Aberash added, «Now all of the family members feel happy and healthy. Children do their home work and study with out any hiderance.">

The work we do with our partners is not just about physical structure but maintianing families diginity, freedom and hope.



Regional Vulnerable group housing and WASH project

This project is an extension of previous projects to support families with various vulnerability contexts in 10 towns of Oromia and Amhara Regional States. Through the project construction/ renovation of houses and communal toilets for families in need of decent housing is carried out. Another component of the project is increasing access to safe water through construction of large reservoirs, pipelines, and water points.

The project includes capacity building for towns' municipalities in waste management and provision of waste containers and trucks. To increase hygiene and sanitation awareness, community members are trained in various topics. More 4,900 families have been served through this project since July 2019.

We work in partnership with government, communities, and other stakeholders to assist vulnerable families to move to decent homes and have access to safe water.













We come together as new community!

Lemlem Berhanu broke up in tears when Habitat for Humanity Ethiopia staff spoke to her during family selection visit in November 2018. Lemlem used to live in collapsing old house in the city of Bahir Dar with two children and two sisters. The family had suffered for many years in the house with broken roofs and dirt floor. Considering the housing situation, meagre income and Lemlem's heath status, Habitat Ethiopia selected the family to be homeowner. Through Regional Vulnerable Group Housing Project, Habitat for Humanity Ethiopia constructed a block of 14 houses for same number of families in partnership with the city's administration. Lemlem and other families moved to new homes in March 2019.

Asked by Habitat Ethiopia staff about the changes they see after they moved to new house, Lemlem said that the new house is a place they call 'our home' and the family started new life. "We are relieved of leaking roof during rainy season and dust floor in dry months. Now we don't pay rent. My children study in clean rooms; they are so happy," Lemelem mentioned.

Lemlem's daughter, Eden, is a grade 11 student. She is one of the highest performing student and she scored 6 A's and 1 B in grade 10 national examination. She wants to be a lawyer to protect the rights of women and children. She said, "We had no freedom in the old rented home. There was no place to study. We were suffering from cold and unpleasant smell. Now I have no words to mention the comfort and future hope we have in the new house."



Habitat for Humanity Ethiopia's work is not just constructing houses and toilets. Our project managers and community organizers worked with local administration, trained the 14 families to restore their community life. The families moved to new homes from dilapidated houses; some of them were in isolated and inaccessible areas. Now, they come together as new community.

"Our hearts are always with Habitat which assisted us to own new home and come together to help each other," Lemlem said.

We started a new life!

"We started a new life. The new house gives us hope. We were not healthy in the old and collapsing house," Mulu Demisse said. Mulu supports a daughter and grandson through selling 'Kolo', traditional snack, on a street in the town of Ambo. In the old house, there was no place to prepare 'Kolo'. Mulu said, "Now there is no worry about leaking roof and dirt floor. I can focus on increasing income. The new house is comfortable for the children."

Mulus' family moved to new house constructed by Habitat Ethiopia in September 2019 under Regional Vulnerable Group Housing and WASH Project. In Ethiopia 7 houses from 10 are in poor condition and needs to be replaced. Considering the huge need of housing Habitat Ethiopia implements projects in Ambo and other towns to assist heads of families like Mulu whose income is very low. Mulu asked, "If Habitat hadn't given us this chance, who would mind visiting the remote and underdeveloped part of the town and help?"



Disaster Risk Reduction Response(DR3)-WASH Resilience Building Project

Initially, the purpose of this project was to respond to El Niño-induced drought which occurred in 2015/2016 to mitigate shortage of water in Southern Regional State. The Project was started in 2017 and now expands its scope to WASH Resilience Building in Oromia regional State, West Arsi Zone, Shashemene, Shalla, Wondo and Negelle Arsi districts. In one year, Habitat Ethiopiaconstructed a reservoir of 100 cubic meter, 17 public water points and 32km pipelines to help families get water close to their homes. Additionally, HFHE distributed non-food items which include water purifying chemicals water containers (buckets and Jerry cans).

This project aims at building resilience for increased access to sustainable and safe water supply for vulnerable communities.

Households in these districts face severe shortage of safe water; only 57% of the population has access to water and 6.3% gets safe water within 30 minutes of walk. Some people have to travel up to 10 km to fetch water.

Households used unsafe water which exposes them to water-borne diseases.

The project also aims at enhancing hygiene knowledge and practice of target communities through training. To ensure sustainable use of water schemes, Habitat Ethiopia enhances capacity of the community, health workers, Water, Sanitation and Hygiene Committees, water board and water caretakers. Collaboration with local Government ensures capacity building of the institutions that have long-term responsibility to maintain the infrastructure.

Habitat Ethiopia also partners with schools to improve sanitation facilities for students and enhance hygiene awareness. Since July 2019, 6660 families get access to safe water and nonfood items, and 151 individuals received capacity building training.

This is a great opportunity-Gishu Hussen

Gishu Hussen lives in Gubata Arjo lowland Kebele(locality) of Negele Arsi district. She is married and a mother of ten children (3 girls and 7 boys). Her family's livelihood depends mainly on agriculture: crops like maize, wheat, and green pepper and rearing animals. Habitat Ethiopia has constructed four public water points in Gubata Arjo Kebele; one of the water points is in front of Gishu's home. Gishu used to travel two hours to fetch water with cart and there were times when she needed to carry a jerrycan of 20 liters on her back.

Goshu explained how Habitat Ethiopia's work brings a difference: "Water collected in that way was not sufficient to my family. We were not able to wash our clothes and keep our personal hygiene. We suffered a lot for years. Many of my children were forced to drop out of school to support me in collecting water. Now we are very happy to get safe water near our home. We are thankful for God and Habitat.

My daughter who completed high school has been assigned by water board as 'water seller'. This is a great opportunity to get income. Now we use clean water; this improves family's health. We wash our cloths and take shower frequently. We keep the safety of the water point to use it for long.">>>

Students at Sayo Laga school in Negele Arsi district expressed joy at school toilet constructed by Habitat Ethiopia. Before the new toilet started service in April 2019, the students face severe problem while they stay at school. Few students used small pit latrine covered with corrugated iron sheet, which was unsafe and not comfortable for privacy. Male students were forced to go to fields and girls must wait util they arrive homes as they could not use open fields. Lack of toilets, water and menstrual kits in the rural district is the critical challenge for female students. Many girls do not go to school and female' dropouts are high in Negele Arsi and other districts. Through DR3-WASH Resilience building Project Habtiat Ethiopia constructed separate toilets for boys and girls at Sayo Laga and other schools.

Hasha Hamide is a 4th grade student at Senkele Guri elementary school in Shalla, a rural district in West Arsi Zone. Before Habitat Ethiopia constructed toilet, the school had not proper sanitation facility; boys and girls had to use small pit latrine together. Girls preferred to wait until they go home as there was privacy in the old toilet. Hasha said that four of her sisters do not go to school(two of them quite) due to many challenges including lack of toilets in schools.

"Staying at school without toilet is very difficult. We can not use fields like boys. I want to thank Habitat for building new toilet. If Habitat had not helped us, we would suffer for many years to come." Hasha said.

Habitat Ethiopia has constructed 12 blocks of toilets in six schools through DR3-WASH Resilience Building Project in Oromiya Region, Negele Aris and Shala rural districts. The toilets serve more than 2,579 students(1,171 females and 1,408 males).

Cholera prevention and mitigation project

Habitat Ethiopia contributes to Cholera prevention campaign launched by government and humanitarian organizations. Following incidences of Cholera in Shashemene town and surrounding areas in 2019, Habitat Ethiopia is implementing a project focusing on prevention and mitigation of the outbreak. The project is expected to contribute to the ongoing efforts of Cholera prevention by government and humanitarian organizations. The project aims at preventing the spread of Cholera through awareness creation on basic hygiene practices and water treatment in Shashemene, Shala, Wondo and Negele Arsi districts.

The components of the project also include distribution of household water purification chemicals, construction of four seat public latrine with roof water harvesting, training of volunteers from community on hygiene and cholera prevention and control. Through this project, Habitat Ethiopia will assist about 40,000 individuals who are exposed to cholera outbreak due to poor access to safe water and sanitation facilities. The community members will have better access to clean water and improved sanitation facilities and hygiene practices through training.

COVID-19 Emergency response Project

While maintaining business continuity Habitat Ethiopia has taken measures which focus on safety of staff and partner families with greatest need. After the announcement of the first confirmed case in Ethiopia on 13 March 2020, Habitat Ethiopia has made COVID-19 prevention effort a priority. Habitat Ethiopia has been exploring funding opportunities to implement projects focusing on WASH Emergency Response to COVID19 Pandemic in collaboration with various partners.

COVID-19 prevention project was launched in June 2020 through providing sanitary kits and food items to most vulnerable families who are severely impacted by the spready of the virus in Lideta Sub City of Addis Ababa and Legetafo/Legedadi town. More than 1,000 households (5,000 individuals) receive sanitary kits(sanitizers, hand wash soap) and food items.

The emergency project aims at improving sanitation and hygienic conditions for families who live in slum areas and face both public health and economic crisis to protect them from infectious disease, including the COVID-19 pandemic.

I used to earn income from daily labor work; Now, I quit my job. It is very difficult to stay at home with my two children without food-Terhas Zewdu, one of the mothers affected by COVID-19 in Debre Berhan town.

Habitat Ethiopia is working with partners to raise more funds and implement additional projects to response to COVID-19 pandemic and protect families and individuals in Addis Ababa and other towns from multiple negative impacts of the pandemic.

In implementing the project and response to COVID-19, Habitat Ethiopia works with community-based organizations and government office. More support is needed from our partners to assist families who have no resources and means to protect themselves from the pandemic.

Habitat Ethiopia established a task force which work with all staff, facilitate delivery of sanitary kits, provide training to staff, share updated information on daily basis through WhatsApp. The task force also outlines scenarios based on the changing status COVID-19 and recommends actions items which help protect staff from the pandemic.

Partner family member speak about the impact of COVID-19

Yeshareg Fantaw,63, lives with her daughter and two grandchildren in a crowded residential area in Addis Ababa. She explained that the spread of corona virus caused many problems. Traditional open markets where she buys food items have limited businesses. There is limited public transportation and taxis are restricted to provide service. People can't meet and assist each other as before; everybody suspect each other.

Yeshareg said, "We are afraid that the worst would come as the disease might cause more damage. Construction work is very slow; it may take long to move out of the current old house situation. The disease causes many challenges and makes life difficult."

International Volunteers Hosting

Habitat for Humanity Ethiopia has been hosting teams of international volunteers under Global Village Program. The strategic engagement of international volunteers aims at creating sustainable relations with our partners and leveraging resources on sustainable basis. Over the last 20 years, Habitat Ethiopia hosted more than 1,900 volunteers from USA, Great Britain, Canada, Ireland, Germany, Canada and other countries. From November 2019 to February 2020, we hosted 7 teams consisting of 90 volunteers, donors, and Habitat for Humanity International senior staff.

Through this program our partners and Habitat staff had the chance to work on construction sites, visit projects, meet partners families, and see the need on the ground. They also share experiences with families and communities and learn more about the local culture.

Future Opportunities, Initiatives and Projects

- ↑ Habitat Ethiopia has been working to explore opportunities and take creative actions to expand its work; respond to greatest need and transform the lives of families and individuals.
- ↑ Habitat Ethiopia has launched Urban WASH Project funded by JTIF-CIEM in Addis Ababa and Shewa Robit town to create access to safe water and sanitation facilities.
- ♠In partnership with Habitat for Humanity Great Britain, TowerBrook, COINS and other donors, Habitat Ethiopia is preparing to start a second phase project to construct new houses, water and sanitation facilities for low income and vulnerable families in Addis Ababa.
- ↑ Habitat Ethiopia has submitted a project proposal to Habitat Great Britain aiming at reducing water born and sanitation related diseases and improving attendance of school children in Negele Arsi rural district. The project is fudded by Overseas Aid & Development Commission.
- ↑Habitat Ethiopia has started implementation of COVID-ER project in Oromia Region, Lege Tafo-Lege Dadi town in partnership with Habitat Korea and KOICA. The purpose of the project is to contain the impact of COVID-19 pandemic for internally displaced people and host community.
- ↑ Habitat Ethiopia has signed agreement with government and started implementation of a 3-year WASH project in Negelle Arsi district. The project is funded by KOICA(Habitat Korea).

The Need

- 70% of housing units require total replacement.
- → 80% of the capital Addis Ababa is considered slum.
- → About 60-80% of communicable diseases attributed to lack of access to safe water and adequate sanitation.
- → Only 17% of the population practice improved hygiene behaviors.
- → Access to improved sanitation is only 20.7% at national level.
- → Coverage of safe drinking water is only 51% country wide.
- → Ethiopia has a long history of drought, shortage of safe water and other disasters.


